# Pinna supports a combination of SYNCHRONOUS AND ASYNCHRONOUS learning environments.

### Synchronous whole-class instruction:

- Teach content-area background concepts and/or vocabulary that students will encounter in a Pinna Original podcast or a selected piece of audio content.
- Listen as a whole class to a chapter, episode, etc. Pause at certain points to pose questions, solicit opinions, or ask for predictions—either aloud or within a chat feature if using a remote tool.

## Synchronous or asynchronous small group instruction in breakout rooms:

- Whether it's a teacher-led center, or student-led discussion, use prompts to lead small group discussion.
- Have students listen to the same audio content in small break-out groups, giving
  each group either a unique thing to listen for, or a different point of view to assume.
  Have the groups then come together in a whole-class lesson (or in a class document) to
  share their thoughts, debate, etc.

### Asynchronous independent work:

- Are students not able to physically get their hands on books for independent or silent reading? Pinna's extensive library of audiobooks provides a great alternative.
- Assign an episode or chapter for independent listening, and then use it as a basis for discussion during the next live ELA period.







### Quentin and Alfie's ABC Adventures (ELA)

- Listen: Each episode introduces a unique letter and letter sound in the context of a fun adventure.
- Direct instruction: Write the day's letter as well as the associated target words for that episode on a piece of paper. Discuss the different sounds the same letter can make.
- Activities include: Practice with letter sounds, letter identification and letter writing.



- Listen: Each episode focuses on a different social emotional skill and how they impact us and the decisions we make. Piper and the Dots (SEL. ELA and Math)
- Direct instruction: Share the comprehension and recall questions that follow each episode found in the Teacher Guide.
